100th Anniversary

Celebrating a Century of Service

Since 1914, The Junior League of Kansas City, Missouri (JLKCMO) has donated more than \$15.7 million and 2.3 million volunteer hours, while serving 350 agencies in our region. JLKCMO has continually adapted its focus to meet the challenges facing Kansas City – from working in Army hospitals during World War I and raising awareness about domestic violence in our earlier history, to championing literacy and supporting children's nutrition and fitness in recent years.

As a result, there was much to celebrate during our 100th Anniversary, and many ways our members and the community could learn from our history. Our celebratory year included inspiring activities, programs and initiatives to commemorate this milestone. JLKCMO also presented a significant gift to the Kansas City community, donating \$1 million to the Kansas City Zoo, as the lead gift in the new penguin exhibit. We were honored to have the cold water penguin exhibit named the Junior League of Kansas City, Missouri Penguin Ice Paradise for everyone to enjoy.

The League presented its \$1 million check to the Kansas Zoo during our Party with the Penguins event on May 10, 2014.

After 100 years, the League still remains the premier volunteer and training organization for women in our community. Our celebratory efforts were an exciting time in our history as we commemorated our past and looked forward to our next century.

- **310,000** subscribers of the *Kansas City Star* received a special anniversary insert in the August 11, 2013 Sunday edition about our work in the community.

Community

Focused on building a healthier Kansas City community

One of the many ways we promote voluntarism is through our commitment to Children's Nutrition and Fitness. Since 2010, we have partnered with our local food bank, Harvesters, and University Academy, a K-12 college preparatory public charter school. Together, our goal is to build a healthier Kansas City community through Healthy U, our signature program.

A critical element of this five-year partnership is teaching students and families about the importance of eating healthy foods and involving them in the fight against childhood obesity. The League and Harvesters educate University Academy students and families about nutrition and cooking, fitness and obesity prevention. Programming includes BackSnacks, family dinners, fitness and health education classes and an onsite garden. Portions of our Healthy U programming also include DeLaSalle Education Center and Dobbs Elementary.

Training

In order to develop the potential of women, we invest in our No. 1 asset, our members. We offer training opportunities throughout the year to help our members succeed as volunteers in the community and to develop into future civic leaders. All members must complete one training class during the League year, but some take two, three or 11, as did member **Jill Frasier**. We train our members by offering interesting topics and membership meetings that are tied to our mission.

General Membership Meetings

During the League year, eight membership meetings were held at various locations across the Kansas City metro area. Members learned about current League business and they also heard from professional speakers about issues facing our community. As a result, they became informed about neighborhood issues, and empowered with advocacy skills to raise awareness and make a collective impact.

New Member Education

This year 94 new members joined our League because of their desire to become volunteers in our community. Our new member program provided a year-long curriculum to immerse our newest members in the mission of the League. They were divided into small groups and assigned a leader who guided them through their first year in the League.

We also enhanced our new member education programming this year by introducing the "Learn It, Live It" program. This new component has provided them with additional League education to help them understand our mission and how volunteer opportunities are tied to our mission.

New in 2013-2014

Advanced Leadership Certification Series

The League partnered with the Midwest Center for Nonprofit Leadership (MCNL) to offer ongoing leadership development training for League membership at all levels. MCNL worked with League leaders to tailor our programs to ensure every member had access to first-class

leadership and professional development programming.

Our members were given a special opportunity this year to participate in the Advanced Leadership Certification Series (ALCS). The program offers 12

ALCS courses over a two-year period for members to earn certification in nonprofit leadership. League members participating in this program are building their potential to be among the most effective of nonprofit and civic leaders in Kansas City and beyond.

Civic Leadership Program

This inaugural program prepared 17 seasoned members for community involvement and civic leadership. The participants studied the needs of the community and learned about leadership and service positions available in the greater Kansas City area. The group met monthly with community and civic
